Word from Pastor Scott: *A Psalm of Thanksgiving* Sunday August 20, 2023

I lift up my eyes to the hills. From where does my help come? My help comes from the LORD, who made heaven and earth. Psalm 121:1-2

This morning, Pastor Kyle will be preaching from Psalm 121 which is one of the nine psalms known as "psalms of confidence." These psalms are expressions of the writers' confident faith and trust in the Lord for Who He is. As such, they are some of the most beloved psalms. Biblical scholar Tremper Longman III, wrote the following about the psalms of confidence in his helpful book "How to Read the Psalms" which I quote here in full: "The psalmist frequently expresses his trust in God's goodness and power. His confidence in God is present as he sings hymns of joy (Ps 46) and as he mourns (3:3–6; 52:8). Occasionally, his feelings of trust dominate the whole psalm, and these psalms we call 'psalms of confidence.' At least nine psalms (Ps 11; 16; 23; 27; 62; 91; 121; 125; 131) are bound together in such a genre. Tone and content, rather than structure, bring them together. In psalms of confidence the psalmist asserts his trust in God, though enemies or some other threat are present (11:2; 23:5). Under such conditions, he is able to be at peace because his God is with him (11:4; 23:4). These psalms contain striking metaphors which show an intimate awareness of

God's presence on the part of the psalmist. God is the psalmist's refuge (11:1;

16:1), shepherd (23:1), light (27:1), rock (62:2) and help (121:2).

The submissive trust which the psalmist puts in the Lord is nowhere more

movingly expressed than in Psalm 131:

I have stilled and quieted my soul;

like a weaned child with its mother,

like a weaned child is my soul within me. (v. 2)"

This week, let the Lord increase your trust in Him as you hear this Psalm of Confidence. Then next Sunday, we will look at Psalm 58, which is one of the "imprecatory psalms" or psalms of "cursing".

That will be a whole other story!
